There will be a large UN conference in Stockholm (Stockholm + 50) on June 2-3 to commemorate the 1972 United Nations Conference on the Human Environment and celebrate 50 years of global environmental action (https://bit.ly/3EB4hmn). The Mother Earth Project has been invited to give a presentation at this event, including displaying 16 parachutes spelling out PEOPLE OVER PROFIT, created a few years ago by two dozen environmental groups in Tacoma, Washington for a climate march. Despite the efforts of the last 50 years, there is still plenty to do to avert the present climate emergency and rising carbon-based emissions, which despite our efforts are projected to continue rising—despite the movement to reduce such emissions by 50% by 2030. Let's all continue to do our part by reducing our own carbon footprint by recycling, using electric vehicles and renewable electricity (https://bit.ly/3EB4uWH), composting and reducing meat consumption and the use of plastic. We must also share our knowledge with others as well as donate to non-profits that are focused on creating a sustainable future.
