This thread allows members to share their day-to-day challenges and ideas for activating change in their communities. In this article, I thought I would share some of the activists' concerns. Although we feel relatively safe in our wonderful Somerset, the rising world temperatures now place all corners of the earth one catastrophe away from being another devastated community.

Drought, Deforestation, Plastic Pollution, Flooding, and Famine

Activists from around the world are reporting problems in their parts of the world. Here are some examples:

- Gracious from Zimbabwe reports: "Chipinge was at the epicenter of the cyclone Idai in 2019 and much infrastructure was affected, ranging from schools, hospitals, companies and churches. Vegetation was destroyed and several fields were washed away. The roads were badly damaged. Lives were lost as people were drowned from the floods and also from dams that were over spilling."
- Evelyn from Uganda reports: "Plastic pollution and famine are the most pressing issues in the country."
- Moise from Democratic Republic of Congo reports: "Deforestation is a major issue in our country, with foreign companies taking all of the profits and leaving Pigmies without their habitat."

Back in the U.S., my recent visit to New Orleans showed that one year after the recent hurricanes, there are more than one hundred blue tarps covering damaged roofs, just within my eyesight. Locals have indicated that there are not enough professional roofers and carpenters to fix all of the devastation. As we all know, service professionals are in great demand nationwide.
